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Grandparents as Caregivers

Grandparents are providing a large share of caregiving today in our country. According to the **United States Census** 2015 American Community Survey:

- 7.3 The number of grandparents whose grandchildren younger than 18 were living with them in 2010
- 2.6 million grandparents were responsible for the basic needs of one or more grandchildren under the age of 18
- 642,852 of the grandparents had a disability and were responsible for their grandchildren

Individualized Education Program (IEP)

Before the IEP meeting you've been writing down plans and organizing your child's information for the IEP meeting. Now that you are in the meeting, what happens now? Here are some suggestions from www.greatschools.org that you may find helpful:

- Know that as a parent, you are an essential member of the IEP team. Federal law requires schools to insure that the IEP teams include the parents of the child.
- Find a way to personalize your child. You know your child's strengths, dreams, interests, and needs.
- Be prepared for staff to refer to assessment data and their observations to support their opinions about what's appropriate for your child. Try to see your child from a different point-of-view.
- **Keep focused** on what you want answered or provided for your child, not on how to get there this is the job of your child's teacher(s) and other school staff.
- Don't hesitate to ask questions and seek clarification.
- Bring a trusted person with you (another set of ears).
- Involve your child in the IEP meeting that's appropriate to your child's age. It's never too early to include your child in the process.
- Ask to take the IEP home to review if you're unable to make a final decision at the meeting. Make sure you do sign where you attended the meeting.

Spring Observances

Please read about some of the spring observances below.

- **Brain Injury Awareness Month** More than 3.5 million children and adults sustain an acquired brain injury (ABI) each year, but the total incidence is unknown. *Brain Injury Association of America* https://www.biausa.org/public-affairs/media/brain-injury-fact-sheet
- National Kidney Month It affects 30 million people in the U.S. (15% of the adult population) and, approximately 90% of those with kidney disease don't even know they have it. (For people at the earliest stages of kidney disease, 96% don't know.) 1 in 3 Americans is at risk for CKD. Kidney disease is the 9th leading cause of death in the U.S. and is growing in prevalence. - **Trisomy Awareness Month** Trisomy occurs when a person has an extra chromosome in most or all of his or her cells—47 chromosomes instead of the usual 46. An extra chromosome can cause health problems ranging from mild intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDDs) to severe physical and cognitive problems. One of the best known trisomy's is Down Syndrome or Trisomy 21 https://www.nichd.nih.gov/news/resources/spotlight/030614-trisomy-awareness.
- National Autism Awareness Month According to Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, autism spectrum disorder (ASD) is a <u>developmental disability</u> that can cause significant social, communication and behavioral challenges. 1 in 68 children has been identified with autism. Boys were 4.5 times were more likely to be identified with ASD than girls. Among children identified with ASD who had IQ scores available, about a third also had intellectual disability https://www.cdc.gov/ncbddd/autism/facts.html
- National Child Abuse Prevention Month In 2015, an estimated 1,670 children died from abuse and neglect in the United States. An estimated 683,000 children (unique incidents) were victims of abuse and neglect in 2015, the most recent year for which there is national data. http://www.nationalchildrensalliance.org/media-room/media-kit/national-statistics-child-abuse
